

9 ways detailing a classic car differs to a modern one:

 Washing: classic cars are more susceptible to water damage. A different pressure-wash approach angle avoids damaging electrical components, breaking seals or flooding the engine bay.

2. Paint:

- a) Due to the composition of classic car paint, the colour is more exposed to the elements. They require a different approach for the machine polish.
- b) Modern ceramic coatings will not bond effectively to period paint types. They require wax based coatings (synthetic carnauba hybrid waxes). These coatings bring out the best of the old methods but with cutting-edge durability.
- c) The depth and consistency of the paintwork is vastly different throughout the entire car. Each panel requires a fresh approach. This level of expertise only comes with experience and training.
- 3. **Interior:** is fragile and therefore easily stained or discoloured by harsh cleaning products. They need an adaptable approach.
- 4. Handling: require an experienced driver to manoeuvre.
- 5. **Carpets:** classic fibres are far weaker. Drill brushes will ruin the carpet, they need natural fibre brushes, e.g., horsehair.
- 6. Banned (yet commonly used) substances: pre-wash, acidic wheel cleaner, iron fall-out remover and adhesive remover. All of which will damage a classic car.
- 7. **Soft tops:** often single skinned so if jet washed will go through the fabric.
- 8. **Trims:** made of metal rather than plastic; they require specialist products.
- Wheels: have different finishes which need specific cleaning and enhancement services.
